WASTEWATER FACILITY EXPANSION

As the City of Wildwood grows, so, too, does its wastewater flow.

In recognizing the need for a proactive approach to future infrastructure needs, city officials last year sought out the assistance of experts in wastewater engineering.

Consulting engineering firm CPH, Inc. was hired to conduct an analysis of the city's historic, current, and projected flow rates, along with a comprehensive evaluation of Wildwood's existing wastewater treatment facility.

In a presentation to the city commission on September 19, 2022, CPH described its findings. Among them were significant increases in recent and projected flow rates along with inefficiencies of the current treatment facility related to its original design many years ago.

CPH proposed a conceptual plan to modify the existing facility with improvements that will add capacity while a new, much larger treatment facility is incrementally planned and designed to handle projected future flow rates.

The project's first phase addresses the current facility's efficiency and increases its functional operating capacity from 2.3 to 2.8 million-gallons-per-day (MGD). A new facility then would be strategically phased to bring on increased capacity over time, as needed, to a total of 6.0 MGD.

This phasing will enable a more cost-efficient project rollout than if the entire facility were designed and built at once.

At its October 10, 2022, meeting, the city commission approved CPH's conceptual design report and proposed scope of services for design and permitting of the project. City staff subsequently advertised a request for proposals from qualified firms interested in providing Construction Management at Risk services for the project.

Those proposals are currently under review and a contract with the winning applicant is expected to be awarded this month.

WILDWOOD'S DOWNTOWN MASTER PLAN WINS DIAMOND AWARD

The City of Wildwood's Downtown Master Plan was honored on January 18, 2023, by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council with a Diamond Award.

Commissioner Julian Green accepted the award on behalf of Wildwood, and City Manager Jason McHugh participated in a panel discussion with other award recipients.

"I am thrilled our plan was chosen for the category of Innovative Places," said Commissioner Green. "It recognizes all of the collaboration that is going into forming and carrying out a thoughtful, creative vision to integrate our city's past, present, and future into a vibrant hub serving the entire community."

Wildwood's Downtown Master Plan is a short-, mid-, and long-range strategy for redevelopment of the city's downtown area, as envisioned by its citizens while incorporating proven best practices and a strategic, sustainable approach to implementation.

"The city hired Ayers Associates to help us develop this plan," explained McHugh. "We worked with them to engage our stakeholders, who can have competing priorities, and bring them together around common goals and a shared vision for our diverse community. Now it's up to us to implement it."

The plan's initial redevelopment will provide an anchor in the downtown area for new investments of regional significance. As it enhances connectivity between new and existing employers, housing, and a rapidly growing, diversified population and workforce, it will provide a balance of live-work-play resources for the community and the region.

Wildwood's Railyard project, announced last fall, is a major component of the plan's first implementation phase. That project will add approximately 125 new parking spaces in a garage on Main Street/US 301 and about 8,000 square feet of new commercial space once constructed.

"It's an exciting time for our city," McHugh added. "We have a passionate commission of elected officials who are committed to seeing this plan and these projects through and making Wildwood the very best city in central Florida."

This brings your home's taxable value down to \$150,000




Wildwood's millage rate of 3.0 is applied for a total tax amount of \$450




Although the city's approved millage rate of 3.0 is slightly above the rollback rate of 2.8684, this figure shows that the city is committed to reducing the millage rate.

DO I LIVE IN THE VILLAGES® OR IN WILDWOOD?

City staff members are often asked this question by new residents. While many people live in one or the other, an increasing number of residents live in both.

The City of Wildwood, within Sumter County, Florida, was established in 1877 as a municipality. Per Chapter 166 of the Florida Statutes, "municipalities shall have the governmental, corporate, and proprietary powers to enable them to conduct municipal government, perform municipal functions, and render municipal services, and may exercise any power for municipal purposes, except when expressly prohibited by law."

The Villages® encompasses both incorporated and unincorporated areas of Lake, Marion, and Sumter counties, and is organized into community development districts that oversee a variety of maintenance, recreation, utility, and public safety services.

According to Chapter 190 of the Florida Statutes, "'community development district' means a local unit of special-purpose government which is created pursuant to this act and limited to the performance of those specialized functions authorized by this act; the governing head of which is a body created, organized, and constituted and authorized to function specifically as prescribed in this act for the purpose of the delivery of urban community development services; and the formation, powers, governing body, operation, duration, accountability, requirements for disclosure, and termination of which are as required by general law."

The City of Wildwood has grown as development in the region has grown. Its boundaries have expanded as land has been annexed into the city by property owners. As The Villages® continues to grow, an increasing portion overlaps city boundaries, resulting in more residents who live both in The Villages® and in the City of Wildwood.

Wildwood and county officials work collaboratively with The Villages® community development district leaders to ensure services are provided effectively and efficiently. For example, those living in both The Villages® and the City of Wildwood are served by the Wildwood Police Department for law enforcement and by The Villages® Public Safety for fire and EMS services.

Wildwood's highly skilled and trained technicians do as much work as possible in-house, saving both time and taxpayer dollars.














MESSAGE FROM POLICE CHIEF PARMER


General Information
