

# ATLANTIC HURRICANE SEASON BEGINS JUNE 1

Atlantic Hurricane Season begins June 1. Weather experts are predicting this year's season will be more active and severe than usual.

According to Brian Lada, AccuWeather meteorologist and staff writer, "A super-charged hurricane season could spawn a near-record number of storms in the Atlantic this year, and forecasters may even run out of names for storms amid a frenzy of tropical systems."

Rather than panic, emergency management personnel urge citizens to prepare and stay informed.

Practical steps residents can take now include the following (source: <a href="www.Ready.gov">www.Ready.gov</a>):

#### MAKE A PLAN

- 1: Start your plan by discussing the questions below with your family, friends, or household:
  - How will I receive emergency alerts and warnings?
  - What is my shelter plan?
  - What is my evacuation route?
  - What is my family/household communication plan?
  - Do I need to update my emergency preparedness kit?
- 2: Consider specific needs in your household. Keep in mind these factors:
  - Different ages of members within your household
  - Responsibilities for assisting others
  - Locations frequented
  - Dietary needs
  - Medical needs including prescriptions and equipment
  - Disabilities or access and functional needs including devices and equipment
  - Languages spoken
  - Cultural and religious considerations
  - Pets or service animals
  - Households with school-aged children
- 3: Create a family emergency plan. A fillable form at <a href="https://www.ready.gov/plan-form">https://www.ready.gov/plan-form</a> can help.
- 4: Practice your plan with your family/household.

# MAKE A KIT

Making a preparedness kit is another important step that should be done before an emergency is imminent.

Experts advise storing kit contents in airtight plastic bags, further assembled into one or two easy-to-carry/transport containers such as plastic bins. Consider including the following items:

- Water (one gallon per person per day for several days)
- Food (non-perishable foods for several days or more)
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio and a NOAA weather radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First-aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags, and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery
- Soap, hand sanitizer, and disinfecting wipes
- Prescription and non-prescription medications
- Prescription eyeglasses and contact-lens solution
- Infant formula, bottles, diapers, wipes, and rash cream
- Cash or traveler's checks
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification, and bank account records saved electronically or in a waterproof, portable container
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Complete change of clothing and sturdy shoes
- Fire extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits and disposable cups, plates, towels, and utensils
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles, or other activities for children

#### UPDATE PROPERTY AND INSURANCE DOCUMENTATION

The time to update documentation and to understand and update insurance coverages is before hurricane season begins. Don't wait to review policies and take "before" pictures until it is too late.


# LIVING WITH ALLIGATORS




# **APRIL IN WILDWOOD**




#### **General Information**
